2023 was an amazing and joy-filled year. Our parish celebrated a wedding, a 50th wedding anniversary, five Baptisms, and four additional Chrismations, in addition to welcoming a steady stream of beautiful visitors and inquirers in every season.

We also solemnized three burials on our grounds: Ella (Skapyak) Handa, Roger Schramski, and Paul Prusak. Holding their lives in love and prayer while experiencing our loss, we celebrate the hope of the resurrection.

I've enjoyed unwrapping layers of meaning in some of Jesus' more obscure parables during Adult Ed sessions this year, always learning way more than I taught. Each person's questions, insights, and wisdom provide an ongoing blessing for everyone present.

I also want to thank the parish for supporting me in my Spiritual Direction certification program. Spiritual Direction differs from both pastoral counsel and teaching in a profound way. Pastoral counsel seeks to help a person address a particular issue they are facing in a godly way; teaching is the transmission of the tenets and practices of our faith to inspire growth. Spiritual Direction is different in that it focuses on helping a person be aware of the ways God is moving in their life, both in the big things and the little. Its goal is to empower a person to hear God's silent voice, to experience the Kingdom of God within themselves.

One of the more meaningful outings we had was when a group from HTOC went to FOCUS in St Paul on a cold, snowy evening this past March, serving warm meals to underprivileged people. A delicious dinner was provided to folks of every race and age: families living in cars, drug addicts, working poor, veterans, and homeless elderly – each one beautiful, and each one treated with a dignity worthy of the image of God within them.

I know that in spite of all the challenges we face in our lives, we will continue to grow in love, in spirit, and in faith in Jesus Christ. It is my deepest desire that each of you continue to experience God dwelling within your wonderful self.

Finally, I cannot thank you enough for all your love and support for Michelle and me. You are truly an amazing church community, and we are so blessed to live and love and celebrate among you.
